Responsible Breeding Checklist

Pre-Breeding Preparation

- **Comprehensive Health Evaluation**: Schedule a thorough physical examination for your breeding dog to assess overall health and breeding soundness.
- Age and Maturity: Ensure the dog is over 1 year old and not on her first heat cycle before considering breeding.
- Routine Preventative Care: Confirm that vaccinations (DAPP and Rabies), fecal exams, and annual heartworm tests are up to date.
- **Breed-Specific Health Testing**: Conduct necessary health screenings such as OFA hips, elbows, patella, thyroid, and PennHIP evaluations.
- **Cardiac Evaluation**: If a heart murmur is detected, obtain clearance from a veterinary cardiologist confirming that breeding will not exacerbate the condition or pass on heritable heart disease.
- **Temperament Assessment**: Ensure the dog has a stable temperament suitable for breeding and can undergo examinations and procedures without sedation.

Breeding Planning and Services

- **Progesterone Testing**: Schedule the first progesterone test approximately 5–7 days after the initial signs of heat (e.g., vulvar swelling, discharge) to determine optimal breeding timing.
- Brucellosis Testing: Perform brucellosis testing prior to each breeding to prevent transmission of this
 infectious disease.
- Breeding Techniques: Discuss and choose the appropriate breeding method—natural mating, artificial
 insemination (AI), transcervical insemination (TCI), or surgical insemination—based on the dog's needs
 and history.
- **Semen Services**: If applicable, arrange for semen collection, evaluation, freezing, and storage for future use.

Pregnancy Management

• **Prenatal Care**: Provide regular veterinary check-ups during pregnancy, including ultrasounds and x-rays, to monitor the health of the dam and developing puppies.

- **Nutrition and Health Maintenance**: Ensure the pregnant dog receives appropriate nutrition and continues with routine health care to support a healthy pregnancy.
- Whelping Preparation: Prepare a clean, quiet, and comfortable area for whelping, and familiarize
 yourself with the signs of labor and potential complications.

Whelping and Neonatal Care

- Emergency Planning: Be aware that FFVH offers urgent care services daily until 10 PM for emergency whelping cases. For high-risk pregnancies, discuss the option of scheduling a planned cesarean section with the reproductive team.
- **Neonatal Monitoring**: After birth, monitor puppies closely for signs of health issues, ensure they are nursing properly, and maintain a warm and safe environment.
- Postnatal Veterinary Care: Schedule veterinary visits for the dam and puppies to assess health,
 administer vaccinations, and discuss deworming protocols.

Documentation and Agreements

- **Breeding Agreement**: Review and sign the <u>FFVH Breeding Agreement</u>, acknowledging understanding of the responsibilities and standards expected.
- Record Keeping: Maintain detailed records of health tests, breeding dates, veterinary visits, and any complications or interventions.
- Puppy Placement: Screen potential puppy owners thoroughly, provide education on puppy care, and establish a contract outlining responsibilities and return policies.
